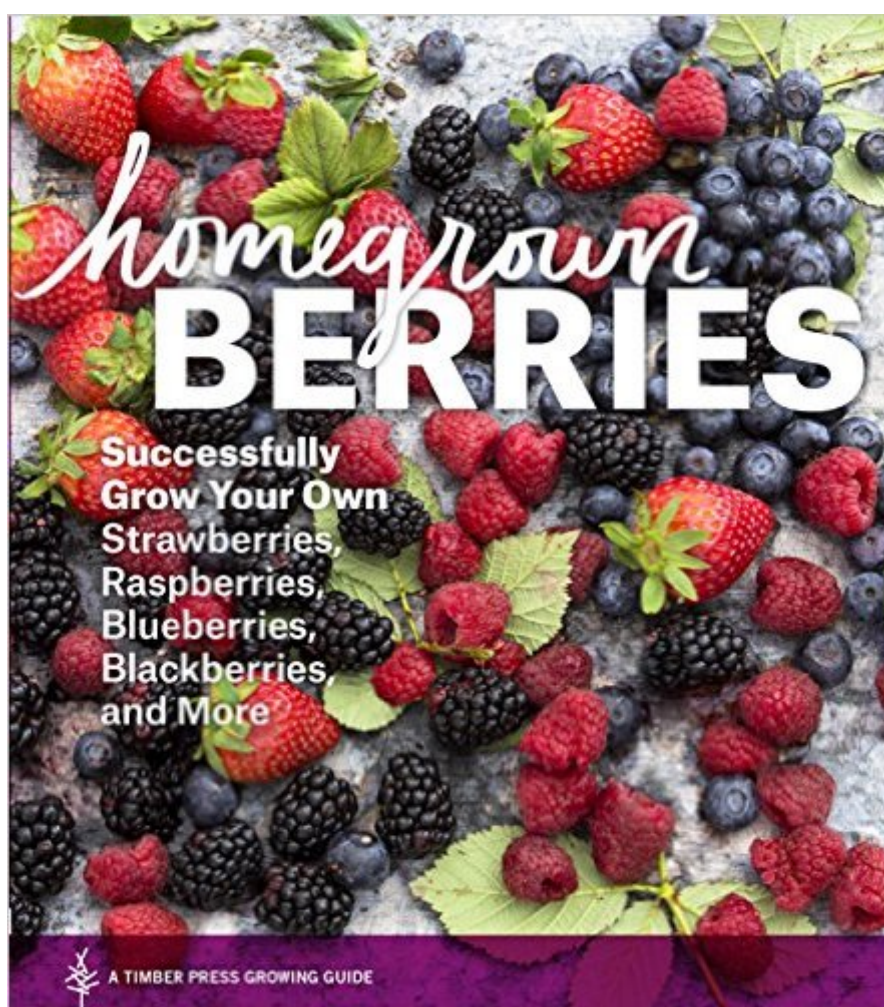

Full disclosure: I received a copy free because I contributed two pictures. Otherwise, though, I was not involved in the book, and no one spoke to me about writing a review. I have now taken a quick look at various parts of the book, and overall I'm quite impressed. I would not suggest this be your \*only\* berry book if you are very serious about growing berries. I would use this book as an excellent complement to The Backyard Berry Book: A Hands-On Guide to Growing Berries, Brambles, and Vine Fruit in the Home Garden, by Stella Otto. The Otto book has excellent material but no photographs, and drawings that are sometimes difficult to work from. This Timber Press book has excellent photographs throughout, very clear diagrams, and updated information about cultivars compared to Otto's book. Much of the information overlaps, but not all. Between this book and the Otto book you should have everything you need to raise most common (and some uncommon)

backyard berries. Having both on hand should make for a very useful berry reference library for the home gardener.

My only complaint is the lack of specification for central southern states when providing recommended plant varieties. Great information, lovely photos, easy to follow. All-in-all, I'd say this is an excellent resource to learn about homegrown berry production.
